# From the Rector

Often in this column at this time of the year I have reported and reflected on seeing the first signs of spring such as crocus arising in the Gorman Memorial atrium garden. No such sightings as yet, for snow still blankets the ground from the record amounts this past winter. The good news is that the snow is receding! The statue of St. Michael in the garden is fully uncovered, and the bench, too. The tops of the azaleas are emerging, flattened and even broken in spots. They will need careful attention and pruning after a "long cold lonely winter," to quote the late George Harrison. Outside my office window sparrows have are returning to hedges nearby, and the occasional cardinal can be heard in the distance. New life, renewal and hope abound. "Here comes the sun," the song goes on. "And I say it's all right."

The liturgical seasons of the church move us from the focus of Lent through the richness – and sorrow – of Holy Week and Christ's passion – to the joy of Easter. Here at St. Michael's we have enjoyed a year of celebration and reflection of the parish's 300 years of serving God and neighbor. As we live into the next 300 years, and more specifically the next

year to five years, we are invited to let arise how we best serve God in Marblehead and areas near and far as "Easter people."



Later this month on April 12, and perhaps on additional Sundays, a "ministry fair" will take place after. It will be chance to share the different ways of deepening spiritual life and service. On Sunday, April 19, the Rev. Holly Hartman, a deacon in the Diocese, will speak at coffee hour about Global Mission and our partnership in Haiti. The Vestry is also considering ways of inviting all in the parish community to reflect on renewing St. Michael's mission and vision. (Such suggestions will be shared as they emerge!)

These offerings come in the joy of the Easter season. It is a time of hope, growth and emergence in the light of a new day. The Lord is risen indeed, and we are lifted with him!

# Worship & Music

#### **Music for Holy Week**

A blessed Holy Week and Easter to you all! This is the most fulfilling and moving experience for our choirs of the whole liturgical year. From the glorious entry into Jerusalem of Jesus through to his resurrection on Easter Sunday morning, the music of Holy Week and Easter spans five centuries of sacred music.

Medieval plainsong and 17th century hymnody complement the Palm Sunday and Maundy Thursday services, with additional music by Bach and Handel. Tim Clay will be our Cantor for Psalm 22 at the Stripping of the Altar on Maundy Thursday, and the entire Youth Choir will lead the music. Good Friday brings us the choral setting of the Passion of Our Lord Jesus Christ According to John, in a musical setting of mine.

The Easter Vigil on Saturday is, of course, the culmination of the week, with the Exsultet sung by Sarah Hunter and the St. Michael's Choir singing music by John Rutter and a magnificent piece by Ralph Vaughan Williams, sung by Gregory Kazan. The Sunday of the Resurrection is celebrated with grand organ music by Vierne and Mulet.

So our Choir can be with their families and friends on Easter Sunday afternoon, there is no Evensong on April 5th.

### John Bours Richmond, Rector, 1851-1859

Like his great-uncle The Rev. Peter Bours (St. Michael's Rector, 1753-1762) John Bours Richmond was loved where ever he served. Born in 1814 to Elizabeth Bours and Perez Otis Richmond, he was raised in Rhode Island and graduated from Trinity College, Hartford in 1840. J. B. Richmond then moved to Virginia to attend the Theological Seminary in Virginia while serving as rector of Christ Church, Lancaster (a beautiful rural brick church built in 1732 in the form of a Greek cross, still containing its original pews and pulpit). About this time he also married Harriet Eveline Cooper and his family grew.

Upon his graduation from seminary in 1843, Bishop William Meade ordained Richmond deacon, and later priest. The Richmonds stayed in Virginia until 1847 when they decided to return to New England. In January 1848 Richmond became the first rector of Christ Church, Swansea, Mass., which had just completed its church building. It was fall 1851 when St. Michael's called The Rev. Richmond as their rector, offering a salary of \$700 per year.

One of the first actions of the Vestry after his arrival was to "ascertain the cost of raising some of the pews" and in summer of 1852 worship services were held in the hall of the Society of the Rechabites. In his parochial report Richmond described "The walls have been beautifully frescoed, and the wood work has been newly grained in imitation of old English oak, and the pillars painted in imitation of Sienna marble. The whole reflects great credit upon messrs. John and William Bartol, of this town, who performed the work." The

bishop also notes that the tomb of the Rev. Peter Bours had been repaired. In the following two years the church was shingled, a furnace erected and gas extended to the Lecture Room (1844 Parish Hall).

Richmond gives credit to "the Ladies of the Parish, with their accustomed zeal and liberality, prepared at a very short notice for a sale of useful and fancy articles, which though held in the parlor of a private dwelling resulted in securing about \$500." And in 1856 "In addition to the old Sewing Circle, ...a new society has been formed of the younger members of the parish, which is now in good working condition. The Rector is happy to acknowledge from this society, a present of a very beautiful surplice and scarf." Richmond also notes the addition of lectures on the 1st and 3rd Sunday

evenings in November and in Lent when the Lecture Room is overflowing. But all is not well. Vestry minutes record the passing of St. Michael's benefactor John Glover Hooper, Esquire, at the end of 1854 and the loss of Harriet Richmond in September 1856. Then there is the economic Panic of 1857. In 1858 Richmond accepts a position in Brockport, NY, but the Vestry persuades Richmond to stay. In September 1858 Richmond marries Deborah Hawks Roundey Quiner, daughter of Benjamin and Ruth Roundey, all now in Medford, but born in Marblehead. Richmond ends his 1858 parochial report with "May our watchword ever be, 'Upward' and 'Onward.'" In May 1859 after a review of the budget, the Vestry votes to reduce Richmond's salary to \$600 a year. In the 1859 parochial report Richmond describes the problem: "While there has been much to encourage, still there is a loss to the Parish in the removals by death, and from town, during the past few years, of those who once rendered efficient service in the support of religious worship..."

The Richmonds moved to the newly formed St. John's Church, Kewanee, Illinois in Dec. 1859. His bishop noted that Richmond preached in his surplice and the chancel was decorated with flowers—"clear evangelical teaching may exist with the dovelike spirit of a holy conservatism." The Panic of 1857 and the Civil War affected Illinois as well, and Richmond became ill and resigned. Around 1863 he moved back to Massachusetts and to serve at Trinity Church in Melrose. Around this time Richmond wrote the earliest known history of St. Michael's for the *Christian Witness and Church Advocate*. St. Thomas in Dover, NH soon called Richmond in 1868 where he thrived until he retired in 1876. Richmond Street in Dover is named for him. Richmond supplied in various area parishes as needed, until the family moved to Medford, MA. There Richmond served as Assistant minister at Grace Church, 1878-1884, remaining in Medford until his death in 1906. - *Frances Stith Nilsson*

Justin was just elected to the Vestry. And, he and wife Paige enjoy helping out with the Lobster Luncheon and the Christmas Fair




