

## Paul Revere and St. Michael's 1818 Bell

St. Michael's first bell was hung in 1718. When news of the Declaration of Independence reached Marblehead in 1776, it was rung so hard by fervent patriots that it cracked. During our nation's Bicentennial in 1976, a TV film crew reenacted this incident for a 30-second "spot" that aired regularly at the time and is now preserved in our Archives. A second bell was installed in 1802 but, according to the records, it was damaged beyond repair in 1817 (it was not uncommon for church bells to crack, and to be recast later with new metal added). The current bell—the church's third—and weighing 839 pounds was cast by "Revere & Son Boston 1818."

Revere—a silversmith, engraver, dentist (false teeth maker), and tradesman of some accomplishment—was also a pioneer in American bell casting. As a teenager in Boston he served as a bell ringer in the Old North (Christ) Church, Boston. After the Revolution he built a foundry to cast copper, brass, and bronze. Paul's two sons and his friend Joseph Warren began a partnership to cast bells. A precise craft; it was trial and error in the early days before Revere got it "right." Of Revere's 16 children, two sons joined him in the bell business: Paul Revere, Jr. and Joseph Warren Revere. Later some grandsons joined. The firm made bells for churches, schools, & ships (USS Constitution included). Revere cast his 1st bell in 1792 when he was 57 years old, and over the next 50 years his firm made

more than 900 bells. Church bells are about 77% copper, 21% tin, and 2% other metals, sometimes including silver to help achieve a mellow tone.

St. Michael's bell probably cost about \$375 (45 cents per pound) in 1818. It was undoubtedly Paul Revere's sons and their workers who hoisted the heavy bell with block & tackle to the tower, taking it through the louvers that can be seen in the tower. (Paul retired from active management of the business in 1811; he died in 1818). The bell was placed on a cradle so it can swing back and forth. A rope in the narthex just inside the front door goes up to

the belfry. When pulled, the rope turns a wheel, swinging the bell in its cradle. A clapper strikes the inside of the bell to produce the sound. A major renovation was undertaken in 1994 to replace worn bearings, improve lubrication, and to preserve the then-rusting cast iron supports.

The Bell Bunch, founded by the late Robert L. Howie, Sr. in the early 1970s, is responsible for the maintenance of the historic Revere bell and related equipment. In pairs, Bell Bunch members climb to the belfry each month to check on the condition of the bell, attend to its lubrication, make sure the bell rope and pulleys remain unobstructed, and enjoy the spectacular 360° views of the harbor and beyond through the louvers of the bell tower.

The bell is in use at every Sunday Eucharist, at weddings, funerals, and other services and special occasions. At the Town of Marblehead's request—on Presidents Day and Independence Day—it is rung for a half hour beginning at 7:30am, 12:00 noon, and 6:00pm. Members of the Bell Bunch and interested parishioners and visitors perform this duty joyfully. We look forward to a special ringing of the bell on our Tercentenary Anniversary Service on September 28, 2014 in honor of our 300th birthday!

This year, during the Lobster Roll Luncheon, Paul Revere himself—in the person of re-enactor Michael LePage—and Mrs. Revere will visit St. Michael's on Sunday, July 6th between 11:00am and 3:00pm to share some history of the church and the bell the Revere foundry cast that still rings out its melodious tones today. Be sure to stop by and say hello!

## Steward of the Month—Harriett Magee

Harriett Magee's family moved to Marblehead in 1961 from Maryland. They were Episcopalians and as a teenager, she sometimes went to St. Michael's on her own. She says, "It was a nice place to go when things weren't going well."

Then off she went to college and later to work overseas. She got married in Sydney, Australia and worked as a social worker in New South Wales. "I was footloose and fancy free," she says.

Eventually she returned to Marblehead in 1973, bought a house, and went to graduate school. During those busy years, with two small children, she listened on Sundays to the Boston University church service at Marsh Chapel on the radio. Then as her two girls grew older, she started attending St. Michael's again. Father Westerberg baptized the girls and she remembers Alma Howie always being welcoming at the coffee hours.

When the children were little, Harriett volunteered in the Church School. Then, Frances Nilsson, Wesley Wild, and she began an after school program in the Davenport House with church support. "Ann Davis' daughter was one of the first teachers. It was a lot of effort but the program had strong credibility," she says. She served on the Vestry and for two years co-chaired the Stewardship Drive with Avery Russell. "It was a pleasure to work with Avery who is organized, creative, and energetic," she says.

She is also a member of St. Catherine's Guild and in past wrote profiles for the newsletter. And of course like so many St. Michael's parishioners, she works on the Lobster Luncheon. "How it all happens each year, I'll never know, but it is fabulous," she says.

Harriet, who has a Master's degree in Clinical Social

Work from Boston College, worked for ten years in Child Protective Services. Then in a career change, she became a business writer, often freelancing. One staff job was with the Investment Advisory Group in Boston, which advises institutions on investments. She has just retired, but continues to freelance.



Harriett's significant other, Barry Weldon, admires St. Michael's especially for its historic building. He has been a steeplejack and is currently working on the PEM's Phillips Library rehabilitation.

Her older daughter Phoebe, who was an acolyte, lives in Santa Clara, CA, with Aaron Windsor and their two daughters who are three and a half and 17 months. After living in New York City for many years, Phoebe now sells NY designer jewelry on the West Coast. "With my own grandchildren in California, I love to see the little kids in church," Harriett says.

Daughter Hannah, who lives in Brooklyn and works in mobile phone technology, got married in November.

For relaxation Harriett plays tennis, and travels to California to see her grandchildren. She takes a dance class in the early morning at 5:45. "Aileen Day is often there, too," she says of the class.

Harriett remembers that Hannah once quoted poet Robert Frost about St. Michael's: "Home is where when you have to go there, they have to take you in. That's what St. Michael's is." Harriett agrees, adding, "At church, people may have different experiences, but it is all okay."

## Construction Update

Renovations of the Parish Hall and accessibility improvements are nearing completion. The exterior ramp has been installed (railings will be added soon) and the lift should be completed in mid-July along with lighting in the lobby and cabinetry downstairs. The Vestry voted to fund a masterplan for exterior landscaping with interim installations in time for the Lobster Lunch (see photo page 6).

Bell tower repairs and structural upgrades will begin in late July in preparation for the late August steeple installation. BWK Construction of Middleton will oversee the bell tower work and Campbellsville Industries of Kentucky is fabricating and will install the steeple.

Through the efforts of Rory Gaunt, St. Michael's has obtained a Green Improvement Grant for \$8000 to install en-


vironmentally-friendly plumbing fixtures in the men's and women's rooms in the Parish Hall.

A new accessible drinking fountain will replace the old one in the basement. Most of the plumbing fixtures have already been installed. We expect remaining funds will be used to improve some of the lighting. The Green Grants are a Creation Care Initiative of the Episcopal Diocese, kickstarted through the Diocesan capital campaign.

Thank you to Jen Hill, Mike Michaud, Kelley Howells & the nursery crew, Doug Major and the choir for all the moving and inconvenience this spring & summer.


