From the Rector: Feed My Sheep

On a Tuesday morning the first week in April, Fr. Max Accime and Fr. Jean Fils met Linda Smidt, Marilyn Day and myself at the Montana Hotel in the hills just above Port-au-Prince, Haiti. Fr. Max is the Priest-in-Charge of St. Thomas Church, Arcahaie, Haiti. Fr. Jean Fils is between assignments at the present. We were joined by three other Americans, Fr. John Kelley and his wife Tish, and the Rev. Nancy Bryson, from St. George's Church in The Villages, FL. I'm very pleased to say that Fr. John and St. George's likely will be joining us in partnership with St. Thomas Church. Fr. Max and Fr. Jean Fils met us to take us to Arcahaie where St. Thomas and its school are located. Arcahaie is small fishing village about an hour outside of Port-au-Prince without traffic. Of course, the traffic was horrendous, so the trip took two hours.

An article appearing in the Feb. 1, New Yorker magazine written by Jon Lee Anderson notes, "Haiti remains the poorest country in the Western Hemisphere. Some sixty percent of Haiti's 10 million citizens live in poverty. Nearly half are illiterate, and only one in four has access to a toilet." These are gripping numbers. It seemed to bear out as we drove through the congested streets of Port -au-Prince and later down the highway on our way to Arcahaie.

At St. Thomas, we were greeted by hundreds of school children, the principal and teachers. All should know that the

money St. Michael's raises through the Lobster Lunch does tremendous good. It pays for the teachers' salaries. It pays for hot meals three times a week. 277 people – students and the staff, including Fr. Max – eat that meal each day it is served.

There is water. We saw the latrine you paid for a number of years ago. By Haitian standards it is the standard. By our standards it is something else, but it is a toilet. Again, the money raised and sent does a great deal. Know that our connection is deeply valued and appreciated.

This was an important trip to make. I hope it is not eight years before we make another one.

Aside from visiting St. Thomas we also attended the Haiti Connection Conference at the Montana Hotel. The hotel was well appointed I have to admit. We had hot water, modern plumbing and wonderful food at our disposal as well. There we heard story after story of the work many are doing in Haiti, which broke one's heart and filled it with hope. We saw the faces of caregivers and those being cared for. In this work these roles were often reversed. For in the other we see the face of Jesus, we see the risen Christ. We may not recognize him at first, but on further reflection know his presence to be there.

Jesus says to Peter, "Feed my sheep." As a church we are called to feed the sheep. In doing so, it is likely our broken souls are fed as well.

The Lobster Lunch feeds not just hungry souls in Marblehead during the July 4

weekend, but countless others in Massachusetts and Haiti. It is a valued, important endeavor. Half the net proceeds goes to Haiti, the other half to local organizations that care for those in need.

At St. Michael's we currently are having discussions on how the church may help homeless families and children on the North Shore. We are exploring a relationship with Family Promise of the North Shore, an organization that successfully helps homeless families find secure housing. This, too, is important and valued work, close to home.

It is risky business this work and these trips, this seeing the face of Jesus in others. It opens our hearts and makes us vulnerable. It connects us with our own brokenness and our own need. Into this opening the risen Christ appears. His light is there. And he calls, "follow me."

****2016-2017 Volunteers Needed****

On June 5th we would like to register at least 5 adults to commit to helping in church school for the next school year. THIS DOES NOT MEAN THAT YOU WOULD BE COMMITTED TO HELPING EVERY WEEK. In fact, during much of the winter we will only need two helpers, so 3 people would have each week "off".

This year there have been 3 very dedicated volunteers who have helped at church school, but some of those volunteers are parents who have children that will be moving on next year, and we will need new people to help. By registering at least 5 people for the year, volunteers can choose ahead of time the weeks that are most convenient for them, and this way I can get any preparatory information to the volunteer ahead of time. In this format no one helper would be overloaded and all would be able to attend full services regularly. Even those who ski on weekends in winter would be able to sign up and volunteer for fall and spring dates. It is also best for the children to have familiarity with their teachers. Also, should a conflict arise, a volunteer could look at our schedule and swap with another church school helper.

You do not need to be a teacher to volunteer! In fact one role each week is that of "Activity Leader". This person does not need to prepare in advance. They simply help greet children, and facilitate our story, craft, and snack time. They are the extra set of hands to set out a snack, or help a child with their gluing, or escort someone to the bathroom, etc.

Lastly, I think that I may be able to speak for those who have volunteered, that it is very rewarding to help St. Michael's church in this way. We have a wonderful group of children and it is inspiring to be part of their spiritual, intellectual, and social growth, and it is also a lot of fun!

Please consider this opportunity to give back to our parish and the children. We will have sign-ups for 2016-2017 Church School volunteers at our June 5th year end celebration and registration day.

Welles Mortimer Partridge, Rector, 1906—1913

Inventor, minister, mendicant friar—Welles Mortimer Partridge (1872-1952) was born in Brooklyn, New York, the youngest of 7 children. His father George Sidney Partridge died in France in 1875 where he was an agent for a N.Y. company. His mother Helen Derby Catlin was a descendant of Hasket Derby of Salem. After her husband's death she and her sons lived first with her brothers in Brooklyn and later moved to Woodstock, Conn. Welles was educated in schools in New England graduating from the Highland Military Academy in Worcester where he learned the strict discipline that helped him in his later life. In 1892 he enrolled in the Massachusetts Institute of Technology to study electrical engineering. However, Welles felt called to the ministry, perhaps inspired by his older brother The Rt. Rev. Sidney Catlin Partridge, first bishop of Kyoto, Japan.

Welles Partridge left MIT before completing his studies and enrolled in the Berkeley Divinity School, graduating in 1898. Answering a call to assist for a year in Alaska. There he began a passion for prison ministry. He described his year there in "The Church in Alaska: The Work at Sitka" published in *The Spirit of Missions*, Volume 65, 1900. From Alaska, Partridge returned to New England in 1900 where he married Clare Morse and became rector of St. Paul's Church in Peabody, Mass. Here his brother Bishop Partridge received him into the priesthood and their only daughter Dorothy was born. While at St. Paul's Welles Partridge expanded the parish, built a new parish hall, ministered to the poor, and after a cholera epidemic co-founded the North Shore Babies' Hospital. Partridge

also filed his first patent in 1904 for a gas stove, and in 1909, for a water heating device.

In 1906 Partridge was called to St. Michael's. During his term a Weekly Kalendar was started with schedule of services, news and notices. Preparations for a 200th anniversary were begun in 1910 with a "buy a tile" campaign to upgrade the sidewalks and an Anniversary Fund to complete work on the Parish House. The large silver alms basin was donated and later a new silver chalice. Partridge wrote a pamphlet on safes, perhaps when St. Michael's obtained the office safe replaced several years ago. With declining attendance teens 14 and up were "Graduated" from Church School to attend church. Partridge also started a kite festival in town and presented the town with a bust of Tennyson made his brother, noted sculptor William Ordway Partridge. However, the rector had repeated illnesses and resigned in 1913.

Partridge worked as a supply minister at various places including St. John's in Portsmouth, NH. There he served as chaplain to the Navy Prison and with the onset of World War I, began work on a large kite to lift a man up from a boat in order to look for u-boats. A prototype was built, but the war ended before more were made. Again, Partridge worked in several churches serving poorer communities around South Boston. With the 1928 Prayer Book about to be published he inaugurated "the laying on of hands" in several churches for those who were ill. However, his own health was getting worse, and in 1930 he stopped all parish work. It was at this time that Partridge lost his two of his brothers, Sidney and William.

Partridge camped that summer in Connecticut and found that the outdoor life restored his health. Rather than return to parish life, Partridge began a 4-year pilgrimage out west and back, traveling by car with his dog Spot, preaching at prisons, hospitals, camps and cathedrals, and depending on the generosity of others for food and gas. It is not clear what Partridge did on his return, although he often volunteered as chaplain to local regiments, and 'supplied' Sunday services. He died in 1952 and was buried beside his wife in Arlington, Vermont. —Frances Stith Nilsson, Historic Church Committee
