## From the Rector: "How awesome is this place!"

*Jacob awoke from his sleep and said, 'Surely the LORD is in this place – and I did not know it!' And he was afraid, and said, 'How awesome is this place! This is none other than the household of God, and this is the gate of heaven.'* – Gen. 28:16-17

On Sunday, Sept. 27, St. Michael's Church celebrated Michaelmas, recognizing the Feast of St. Michaels and All Angels and the parish's namesake. (As permitted, the date was transferred from its official day of Sept. 29 to the Sunday preceding.) The ten people at the 8:00 a.m. said service participated in a meditative, quietly joyful celebration. The one hundred plus people at the 10:00 a.m. joined in festal service with a procession, incense, song and prayer. At the 10:00 a.m. service the church welcomed two new members into the Household of God through their baptisms. One of the baptizees - at the mature age of 6 months – was expressive of her participation especially as the baptismal water was poured over her forehead. Vocally filled with God's spirit during the baptism, she then found peace, sanctuary and safety in her parent's arms. The other baptizee - a bit younger at just over two months old – meditated deeply with his eyes closed during the baptismal, stirring only slightly as the water washed over him.

The two different services, and the experiences of the two infants baptized, bring to mind two dimensions of our spiritual life and call to ministry: the active life and the contemplative life. These two aspects are

not exclusive of the other; each is needed to strengthen the other. Frequently after a public ministry Jesus takes himself and his disciples away to pray in private. Timothy Radcliff, OP, in his book **Why go to church?** reminds us that we go to church "to be sent from it." We are sent back into the communities and workplaces we know with the grace of God and light of Christ showing through us.

The first reading on Michaelmas is always the story of "Jacob's Ladder," where Jacob has a dream of a ladder or ramp set up to heaven with God's angels ascending and descending on it. Jacob awakes, realizes God's presence, and proclaims, "How awesome is this place!" There are the moments in the quiet of corporate prayer or in the music of hymns, choir and organ when it is awesome and awe-inspiring. It is my hope that people find both the quiet renewal and active inspiration at St. Michael's to serve God and neighbor within and without the parish community. This is not to say by any means that "awesomeness" of God's presence can be found only here. To the contrary, it is present in all places of our life, in the joys we share and in the challenges we face. It is a gift to be nourished in God's spirit within our church walls and be sent out into the world to encounter it more.

Michaelmas sets us forth more fully into the fall and church year. It is an active time! Church school, adult and youth choirs, St. Catherine's Guild dinners and Fashion Show, Evensongs, Organ Recitals,

Another connection - the Nobles had a house in Rockport where I first lived when moving here in 2002, and he is buried in the town cemetery there. His music is energetic and beautiful, and those who attended the Evensong in Andover last week (thank you for coming!) will hear his Magnificat and Nunc Dimittis again on October 4th.

## William Robert Harris, Rector 1878-1886

After the resignation of The Rev. Julius Ward, two Vestry members consulted with the bishop. The Vestry then invited 3 ministers to preach over several Sundays before calling The Rev. William Robert Harris as Rector. He was offered a salary of \$800 with the use of the rectory "for the present, but that the salary shall be raised to a sum corresponding to that paid the past rector as soon as the Parish is in a financial condition to warrant such action." On May 6, 1878, the grandson of The Rev. Dr. William Harris, was installed as rector during a visit of Bishop Paddock. The Rev. Dr. Harris was St. Michael's rector 1791-1801 before moving to New York and becoming president of Columbia College.

William Robert Harris was born in New York on June 12, 1838, the son of Caroline and the Rev. Dr. Robert William Harris. W. R. Harris grew up in White Plains and Astoria and graduated from Trinity College, Hartford, in 1858 and Berkeley Divinity School in 1861. On May 2, 1861 he was ordained deacon by Connecticut Bishop John Williams and assisted at St. James in New London. Having been received as priest in 1862, Harris moved to the Diocese of Western New York, serving at Grace Church in Utica.

On April 25, 1867, Harris married Augusta Bogart and their only daughter Henrietta Laura Bogart Harris was born the following year in Brooklyn. The Harris family resided in the New York City area for several years until he was called to St. George's in Lee, Massachusetts. St. George's prospered and while there, Harris was also able to reopen St. Paul's in Otis, MA, gathering funding from various sources for repairs. At his resignation in 1878, two churches were without a rector.

During Harris' tenure at St. Michael's 1878-1886, the Parish House was enlarged, a water closet added to the Rectory with other campus improvements, and major changes were made to St. Michael's legal organization. On


April 17, 1882 the proprietors of St. Michael's voted that "a conveyance of the Church, Chapel and land belonging to the Parish be made to the Trustees of Donations of the Protestant Episcopal Church, a corporation duly established by law, to be held in trust under the law regulating said corporation." At the same meeting, a new Constitution and By Laws was also approved. Then the General Court was petitioned for an amendment to the Parish Charter "to admit members of the parish to vote in parish meetings." Up till then, only pew owners (proprietors) could vote. For several decades, though, the budget had been developed on an every member canvass instead of on pew taxes.

An early highlight to Harris' tenure was Feb. 6, 1880 when the Parish celebrated the centennial of St. Michael's reopening after the Revolutionary War. Bishop Benjamin Paddock gave the sermon and "In the evening there was a social gathering in the Rectory where an historical address was delivered by Samuel Roads, Jr." How appropriate to have present both the grandson of one of St. Michael's early

Episcopal rectors and Vestryman Elias G. Smethurst, descendant of Woodward Abraham, Lay Reader in charge in first years after the Revolution.

By the end of 1885 all was not well, though, and Harris reluctantly resigned in May 1886 to take a position in New Jersey. Harris served happily at St. John's in Somerville, NJ, 1886-1892 and caused a new church to be built for St. Paul's Bound Brook. He did not make the 1888 celebration at St. Michael's, but he did donate that year copies of both Pigot and Barnard's Christmas sermons to the Massachusetts Diocesan Archives. Harris took a break for several years due to ill health, and in 1904 took charge of Gloria Dei Church, Palenville, NY and St. James Mission in Dover Plains, NY. where he died in 1907.

## Steward of the Month: Elizabeth Grader

Liz started attending St. Michael's in the 70's when her sons Derek and Matthew began Sunday School. The boys joined the choir under Barbara Bruns. "Barbara was a genius," says Liz. Later they both were acolytes.

She remembers their confirmations vividly. Derek did not want to do the classes so finally Liz told him that if he got confirmed she would buy him whatever he wanted. Sure enough, he was confirmed and then announced that he wanted to go the Kittery Trading Post. It turned out he wanted a rifle that he was too young to buy. So Liz says, "There I was buying a rifle and having to register it with the police!" Matthew in his turn was confirmed and told his mother not to worry because he did not want a rifle. Liz breathed a sigh of relief until he told her he wanted a compound bow! They both became good hunters.

Over the years, Liz has been very active at St. Michael's. She served on the Vestry. "Around the same time as Barry Weed and Harriet Diamond," she says. She chaired the Christmas Fair twice and volunteered at My Brother's Table. She is a long time member of St. Catherine's Guild.

However, she has been the backbone of the Thrift Shop for many years. "Muriel Crowninshield sat in the pew behind me and kept telling me to come down to the Thrift Shop when it was on Washington Street," she remembers. About that time she sold the Garden Center on West Shore Drive that she ran for years and had a shop in Salem. "I kept Tuesdays free for the Thrift Shop," she

says. Washington Street had one advantage over the current location at Davenport House: easy accessibility for loading and unloading donations. "I used drive up on the curb to unload things on Tuesday mornings and then load things at closing for the Swap Shop on Wednesday morning as I headed for Salem," Liz says.

Despite the lack of easy access for donations, Liz likes the current location because the shop is part of the church grounds now. Liz sorts all the donations. If things are out of season, she takes them to the Red Cross bin because the shop has no storage space. She says, "We couldn't have the shop without Jen. She's a gem. I can call her with times I will be here and she will come to take the trash."

Some customers come in several times a week. "If people don't have a lot of money, they have to spend time looking for what they need in all the thrift shops," she says.

The biggest problem for the Thrift Shop is recruiting volunteers to staff the shop, two people a day, Tuesdays through Saturdays, 1 to 4. She and Mae Britt Wang are there every Tuesday, but Saturday people work once a month usually. There is a list of about 25 people, but not everyone does a shift once a week every week. "I'd like to see more men volunteer. Fred Alling and John Hunt used to work and James Dearborn does volunteer. It would be great to have a men's group," Liz says.

"Please keep the good stuff coming," she says.

## St. Michael's Thrift Shop Celebrates Its 76th Year in Marblehead

Colonel and Mrs. Mary Hodges (wealthy parishioners) moved to Marblehead from Boston. Twelve women of St. Catherine's Guild, including Mrs. Hodges, brainstormed to see how they could raise money for a new Parish Hall. Mrs. Hodges who had a thrift shop at her church in Boston suggested that they start a thrift shop rather than run rummage sales. The story goes that the women borrowed \$10 to pay the rent from St. Catherine's Guild and St. Michael's Thrift Shop was started in 1939. The thrift shop's first home was located in an old bakery on Washington Street and has moved to various locations on Washington Street until moving to its new home six years ago at 28 Pleasant Street (first floor of St. Michael's Davenport House church property).

There have only been five chairmen over the past 76 years. Ruth Conly (mother of Bill Conly) was the first chairman for 12 years, followed by Hazel Graves for 22 years. Hazel Graves' daughter, Jackie Williams, continues the family tradition as one of its current officers. Eleanor Harlow and Florence Dow served as chairman and the current Chairman, Elizabeth Grader has been president since the 1990s. Current officers include Mary Williams, Treasurer and Jacqui Williams, Secretary. The office of Vice-Chairman is open. St. Michael's Thrift shop is run entirely by approximately 20 unpaid volunteers.

Next to parishioner's pledges, St. Michael's Thrift Shop provides tremendous financial support to the church. The thrift shop pays the church \$500 each month to rent the church property and over the last several years

provides additional funding of between \$5,000 to \$10,000 each year. Over its history the Thrift Shop has paid for the down payment for the Davenport and the Murray House, donated funds towards a new kitchen and dishwasher, dishes, carpets, lights, etc. Over \$270,000 plus furnishings, altar hangings, speaker systems and more have been given back to the church in the past 76 years.
